Sun Mar 17 85^{eme} Evacuation Day Parade So Boston - 11:30 am assembly; 1 pm step-off (\$\$\$\$\$\$\$\$\$)

Our first parade of the year and a big fundraiser (\$1000) – let's have a good turn out. Notwithstanding the length (4 miles) and potential for cold, we turn the wait in the parking lot into a tailgate party complete with mulled cider (feel free to bring anything you'd like to contribute), march the requisite 4 miles up more hills than down, fire our annual volley at Dorchester Heights to commemorate Evacuation Day (the 225th this year!) ... and then head to Waltham for an early dinner and beer at Watch City Brewery. Don't lose heart if the weather's bad --- think of the rest of us who will miss you. Dress is French with white gaiters: if you don't have French kit, you can borrow one. Bring a full canteen, you'll need water. Assemble in the Gillette Parking lot at 11:30 (map & directions in the next newsletter). If you have a problem getting to the parking lot, park along Dorchester Ave (which is the straight line street that connects the route's starting point with the ending point). Step off is at 1 pm, but you won't be able to get into the parking lot after 11:30 -- bring something warm to wear while we wait. If anyone wants to caravan from Nelia's house, give her a call (781-899-5334). Note to those who do militia and not French: historically, we've done this as a French parade ... last year we did it as 2 companies (French and Militia) ... we'll talk about what to do this year at the meeting on the 9th. Those of you who came last year as militia certainly added both to the fun and to our our presence on the street – it would help our planning to know how many of you would be willing to come this year if we did something similar.

We've had fun together ... we've turned out to support and educate the communities around us ... and we've marched through the 1776 campaign year. Thank you to everyone who put in work to make it all happen, who marched in the parades, who shared time and homes, who contributed ideas and effort ... and to each and everyone of you for making us who we are. Vive le Regiment! and Huzzah! to all of us.

Onward to 2002 ... we'll vote on our schedule at the meeting, but a quick look will show that a good portion of our year will be a continuing journey through 225th events, this year re-creating 1777: May 1777 at Hartwell Tavern, Buryoyne's Campaign (Crown Point), Hubbardton, a general call up of militia troops in August in response to the fall of Fort Ti and Saratoga. In addition to parades, we will have two opportunities to turn out as French: the Artillery Weekend at Fort Adams in Newport and Williamsburg over Labor Day weekend.

For those who weren't at the meeting, the suggestion (and request) was made to move towards more communication by email and use newsletters for AARs, research and other non-time sensitive information. Many people have said they'd rather get schedule information by email ... and much of the information we receive from event coordinators comes by email, so it's more effective to pass it on that way. Reliance on email, also allows me to get it to you in a more timely. So we'll be experimenting with a newsletter every 2-3 months and continuing the current email communications. If there are other email addresses you want on the list, please let me know. For those who don't get emails (or can't check it frequently enough), I'm looking for volunteers to form a phone chain to call them and pass on the information.

I'm looking forward to seeing everyone at the meeting on the 9th. Anyone who needs a place to stay, call Steven (508-877-9648) and he'll try to coordinate floor space. For those outside of Boston, if you can't make it on the 9th, try to come up for Battle Road weekend. 6/29	85 ^e	Rededication of Conanicut Battery: we have been invited to participate in the rededication of the 1775 Conanicut Battery on Prospect Hill, Jamestown,, RI a gun battery built by the Colonials by order of the State Assembly. This small earthworks was later in 1775 occupied by the British, and Hessians were encamped on our island, and when the British left Newport, by the French. Jamestown is an island in the mouth of Narragansett Bay and the fortification was intended to guard the West Passage and thus protect Newport and Providence.
July 6-7	4 th	Hubbardton – 225th Commemoration of the Retreat from Mount Independence and the Battle of Hubbardton.
Aug 10 or 11	4 th	Militia Muster: Continuing our recent tradition of finding ways to work with other local units to focus on what was happening in New England, Henry Cooke suggested a recreation of the general call up of militia troops following the fall of Fort Ti in July. To summarize Henry's idea: "The fall of Ticonderoga in July and the retreat of the Northern Army down the Hudson during July and August struck at the psyche of New England like a thunderbolt. It was effectively their version of September 11 - for the second time in two years. A general call up of militia troops in early August drew men from Massachusetts and New Hampshire. The influx of militia turned the tide at Bennington and the large turnout of troops in September gave the Continentals the strength they needed to march north to face Gen. Burgoyne's overextended troops on September 19th and October 6th. During those hectic weeks, men and supplies would have been a common sight along the road as New England moved to stem the tide of disaster that threatened to cut them off from the rest of the continent."
