Now that we've moved beyond the 225th of the early war campaigns, we need to go back to marching this parade as Saintonge in keeping with our contract with the parade organizers. Which means that we'll have to say au revoir to some of our stalwart militia friends who marched the South Boston hills with us these past two years. We'll miss you guys ... and would welcome any of you who'd like to borrow French kit and march with us as Saintonge. To les soldats du roi ... here's our chance to fine tune what we've been working on in the drills and get some practice for the drill competition in June. It's our first parade of the year and a big fundraiser (\$1000) – let's have a good turn out. Notwithstanding the length (4 miles) and potential for cold, we turn the wait in the parking lot into a tailgate party

complete with mulled cider (feel free to bring something to contribute), march the requisite 4 miles up more hills than down, fire our annual volley at Dorchester Heights to commemorate Evacuation Day ... and then head to Waltham for an early dinner and beer at Watch City Brewery. Don't lose heart if the weather's bad --- think of the rest of us who will miss you. Dress: French, white gaiters. Bring a full canteen, you'll need water. Assemble in the Gillette Parking lot at 11:30. Directions: get off the Southeast Expy/93 at the Broadway bridge and turn left at the light after you cross the bridge. If you have a problem getting to the parking lot, park along Dorchester Ave (which is the straight line street that connects the route's starting point with the ending point). Step off is at 1 pm, but you won't be able to get into the parking lot after 11:30 -- bring something warm to wear while we wait. Sat Mar 22 4th Buckman Tavern – Militia Muster – 11 AM

Spring came early in 1775, the light snows of January and February barely muffled the sound of the militia at drill. This year all had changed. In the past, militia drill was a social occasion, however with the rising crisis in American-England relations changed this, with the courts closed, the legislature was meeting in secret and angry mobs were protesting changes imposed by Parliament. The militia training was being taken seriously. Some companies were drilling four times a week. Join the local militia at Buckman Tavern, across from Historic Lexington Battle Green, as they show their martial drill and elect their officers. That's the version for the public ... equally important for us is that this is a chance to drill with other units we will be fielding with before Battle Road. Drills not only increase the safety of the event, but also familiarize everyone with the field maneuvers, making it more fun. All men-at-arms and field musicians who plan to be at Battle Road must be at at this drill (unless you live too far away to reasonably make the drive).

2003 preview: With the 225th anniversary of the French Alliance which was sealed by the treaties of February 6, 1778, we re-focus our energies on our Saintonge impression as France prepares to enter the war. More of the drills and parades will be French ... but we will fight as militia for the two 225th events on the schedule: Monmouth in June

and the Battle for Rhode Island on Labor Day weekend (a key 225th event for New England militia units). French events on the schedule include a French Army Demonstration at MMNHP on May 10, the Northern Dept CL Garrison Weekend at Strawbery Banke June 7-8 (including the drill competition & a celebration of the signing of the French Alliance), and several possible tacticals. See the schedule included in this newsletter for more details.

One of our goals for the year is to have more drills and more informal opportunities for the Regiment to get together so that we're not trying to sort out the entire year at one meeting in February! At least one of those gatherings will be a French drill & demonstration at the Visitor's Center in May ... we haven't done that in a while. In keeping with the experience of the French marching through towns on their way south, we'd certainly expect to see plenty of non-French in attendance. We're also hoping to find more things to do informally as a group ... thank you to Carrie Albertin for organizing our trip to Two Towers and dinner beforehand. We will set up a small French camp at the Visitor's Center (down near the pond leading from the parking lot) and spending the day doing drill and music demonstrations. When Dan & Judy or Ed are available we've set up Medical and Engineeer's demonstrations as well. Because the French marched through many towns on the way south to Yorktown and occasionally had visitors from General Washington's army, this is the sort of informal event that can absorb civilians, militia, and even some of our later-war allies. It's an opportunity not only to talk to the public, but to educate ourselves by pulling together what we know of the French camps. And an excuse to pull out Bob Selig's research and some of the order books to think about ways to improve our impression for the Garrison Weekend in June.

Memorial Day Parades: May 25: Somerville (\$700) (Militia)

May 26 Andover (\$300) (French) Medford (\$500-600) (French)

May 30-June 1: 225th Anniversary of the Battle of Cobleskill (BVMA); CL/BB Tactical -- tentative

We tentatively voted to include this in our schedule, pending more information about the event. Cobleskill is one of those places in NY that the Loyalists and their Native American allies raided (looking out over the next couple years, we've got a lot of chances to drive to NY to commemorate these constant raids). Apart from an effort to have some of the Northern Dept events west of the Hudson, the big draw here is that it will be combined with the Grand Gorge Tactical ... which should make it a fun weekend. The good news is that Grand Gorge is supposed to be a great site and a cool event. The bad news is that it's sandwiched between the Memorial Day parades and the Garrison Weekend (both more important weekends for the Regiment that we shouldn't undermin), followed later in June by the Bunker Hill Parade and Monmouth.

June:

June 7-8: Strawbery Banke Garrison Weekend and Drill Competition, Portsmouth NH (French)

"Theme for the weekend is the "Citizens, Soldiers & the French Alliance", and will include an encampment at Puddle Dock, a military parade through downtown Portsmouth, the unloading of French military supplies from the Gundalow and transporting them by ox cart to the warehouse, issuance of muskets and clothing, civilian interpretive activities, lectures on a variety of topics including a keynote address by George Neumann, a display of military artifacts resulting from the Alliance, an evening feu de joie, followed by a dance sponsored by the 1st New Hampshire in honor of their 30th anniversary. One of the highlights of the weekend will be the competition for the coveted Strawbery Banke Cup, which will include drill and maneuver components to wrest the Cup from the greasy grasp of those pork rind eating heathen of New Jersey!" [from the 10th Mass newsletter. 10th Mass is one of the event sponsors.]

For those who haven't participated in a Garrison Weekend, the idea is to portray an army in garrison as opposed to fighting in the field. Strawbery Banke is a terrific venue and a fun place to spend a weekend. There will be plenty of opportunity to demonstrate both military and civilian activities. And we expect to finish the weekend with the celebration of the return of the Drill Cup to the French army!

June 15: Bunker Hill Parade as part of Militia Battalion (\$1000)

June 21-22: March out of Valley Forge (probably not something we'll do in large numbers, but all are welcome)

June 28-29: Monmouth (225th) (Militia)

July:

July 26-27: New Ipswich encampment w/ 2nd Mass

2nd Mass has invited 6 local units to join them at their annual encampment at the Barrett House in New Ipswich, NH. They've been doing this event for several years with the Ist Foot Guards. In addition to small American and British encampments, a number of craftspeople set up around the house. And the Guards usually set up a cricket or trap-ball pitch on a grassy field. Small events like this can be a fun way to enjoy a weekend with friends from other units in a relatively low-key fashion (translation: no guard duty and you can walk between camps without showing passes ©). And this particular event has historically attracted a large number of spectators and kids who enjoy drilling with wooden muskets and learning 18th century games.

August:

Aug 23-24: Fort Revere (French)

We've been doing this event in small numbers (2-3 people) for the past several years to help support the fort. With a relatively slow summer schedule, it is a good opportunity to set up a largerFrench encampment and spend a weekend together in late August.

Aug 30-31: 225th Battle for Rhode Island (Militia) – Glen Farm Park, Portsmouth RI www.brigade.org/barcal/BRI.html

The Battle for Rhode Island saw the participation of many New England militias and is a key 225th event for us to be a part of. More to the point, the site is unbelievable and we're in for a great weekend. Plan is to recreate the "Battle of Hessian Hollow" on Saturday afternoon and the "Battle of Rhode Island – Attack of the Mass. Troops" on Sunday afternoon. Sunday morning, there will be a tactical in a ravine bordering the encampment (which has a bridge to die for!). The American camp has running water & showers and borders Sutler Row. The site is just down the beach from a public beach with a life guard. What better way to spend Labor Day weekend, huh? We're north of Newport, so we'll avoid the Labor Day traffic nightmare ... an easy trip back for the Marlboro parade on Monday! Space is somewhat limited so we need to get returns in quickly – units will be accepted on a first come basis. Because of this event, we will put off a return to Williamsburg until next year.
