DRILL & Swap Meet, Saturday, April 3 ~ **Arrival:** 9 AM sharp and wrap up around 4:00 **Directions:** From Route 3 heading North towards the NH border take exit 35 Dunstable / Tyngsboro. This exit will bring you onto Route 113, head west. Proceed on Rt 113 about 4 miles and you will come to the center of town, White Church on the Left - Red brick Town Hall on the right. Parking will be available near the Town Hall. For those of you coming a longer distance you may want to car pool. Details: The focus will be drilling as amalgamated units, giving Captains and NCO's the ability to try commands that need more than one platoon. Each Capt - NCO group will be assigned a time on the schedule to command the unit. The day will end with a mock formation with Lights, Militia, and Infantry maneuvering on the field. Based on attendance we may be able to form light, militia and infantry companies. Please come in full kit as either Militia or CL.

DRILL Saturday, April 9. ~ Arrival: Plan on arriving at the wayside at 9:30am Directions: East of Sudbury. Rt. 20 West. Into Sudbury take a right at large green sign "Wayside Inn Road" and the Inn is 1/4 miles down on your right (parking on your left). West of Sudbury: Rt. 20 East for approximately 5 miles, past The Home Depot for .8 miles and turn right for "Wayside Inn Road." Go back across Rt. 20 and travel down Wayside Inn Road for approximately 1 mile, and the Inn is on your left (parking on your right). Details: In preparation for the Battle Road 2005 event on April 16th, the 4th Middlesex will be having a combined drill with the Sudbury Companies of Minute and Militia. REGIMENTAL WORK PARTY, Tuefday,

April 12 ~ Arrival: Doors open at 7pm. Folks are invited to stay until 9pm. Directions: Bill & Cori Rose will be opening their home to us for the evening. Their address is 36 Rocky Dundee Road in Bolton and the phone number is 978.779.5488. (Editor's note: These directions are my best recollection on how to get to Bill's - if you haven't been there before, please email the list to verify the directions) The best route to Bill's house is from Route 495. From Route 495, take Exit 27 (Route 117) and head west on Route 117 into Bolton. In Bolton center, at the blinking light, take a left onto Watoquodoc Road. You will pass Nashoba Valley Winery and Orchards on your left. Take your next left onto Old Bay Road – it's a sharp turn and easy to miss. Follow Old Bay Road to the end and take a right. You will pass Rocky Dundee Farm (or something with a similar name) and the road will end a bit further ahead at a dead end/dirt path. Take a left turn immediately before the dead end. Follow the road around the island and continue straight on the far side. Bill's house is the large colonial on a slight rise - #36. . **Details:** Bill Rose is generously offering his home for a series of winter work parties over the coming months. They will be held on the second Tuesday of each month, from approximately 7pm to 9pm – any changes will be published to the email list and in upcoming newsletters. Bring whatever project you are currently working on - cartridge boxes, gaiters, hats, musket repairs, leatherwork or sewing – whatever could use a few more hours of work! Projects that will be given special attention will be listed in the February newsletter – call Bill, Steven or Dana with questions or suggestions.

BATTLE ROAD: THE PRELUDE TO WAR, Saturday, April 16. ~ Arrival: Friday April 15. Encampment areas open from 5:00 pm for those re-enactors wishing to stay overnight. If overnight camp is set up, Camp Quartermasters should be available to ensure set-up in correct areas. For those Re-enactors arriving on Saturday, please plan to be at the park between 8:00am and 9:30am. Directions: Parking for this

year's event will be at Lincoln North.. From I-95/Route 128 - Take the Route 2A exit (Exit 30) towards Concord/ East Lexington. At the end of the ramp take a Right on Route 2A West. Follow Route 2A for 1.3 miles. Take a right onto Hanscom Road. Follow Hanscom Road for .6 miles. Take a left onto Old Bedford Road. Follow Old Bedford Road for .2 miles, Lincoln North office park will be on your left. Once you have parked, follow the path at the back end of the parking lot to Old Virginia Road and onto the Hartwell Tavern. Details: This event will be very similar to Battle Road 2004 held at the Hartwell Tayern. Since the event scenario is set in 1775, we'll be attending this event as 4th Middlesex – so please dress accordingly. Due to the large number of participants there will be no organized commissary – all participants must provide their own food and drink. Last minute details will be available at www.battleroad.org. Now that the mundane details are out of the way, read on to learn more about the scenario for the day...

The year is 1775 and the fate of Massachusetts and perhaps all of New England is in doubt. General Gage and his Boston Garrison have been enforcing the Boston Port Bill and the Massachusetts Government Acts of 1774 for the past year. These acts of coercion are in response to Boston Town's refusal to pay a tax on tea. This tax was forced on this town without consent as the ship money of old. The Acts themselves exempted soldiers and officials from being tried in the colony, gave the King the right to appoint the Governor's council, gave the King's Sheriffs the power to choose jurors for local trials, limited our town meetings to one per year, and most insultingly closed the port of Boston. Tensions had increased over that year and almost reached a boiling point in February when a British column under Lt. Col Lesley attempted to raid Salem in order to obtain the arms stored there. Conflict was only avoided after the citizens of that town negotiated with Lesley such that his soldiers would cross the bridge, forgo their raid, and then depart thereby minimally carrying out their orders.

Since the showing in February, the Regulars have been holed up in Boston while the countryside is abuzz with preparation for General Howe's next move.

Boston Garrison (located at the Captain Smith House) Come visit the soldiers and loyal citizens of Boston as they go about everyday life in a garrisoned town. Tour the Regular's encampment, visit headquarters, observe the soldiers drilling, or speak with some of the citizens from Boston about their feelings on recent events.

Boston Neck (located on Old Virginia Road)

Aside from crossing to Boston by water, Boston Neck is the only access to the town. Notice the fluidity of the situation during this time prior to war as people from the town leave as refugees. Meanwhile, the Redcoats are living in their encampment on Boston Common. The British Army surgeon may pay a visit there to examine the soldiers and attend to their sick. Supplies from the countryside cross into Boston to the patriotic citizens left and some people cross into Boston on Provincial "business". Beware of the guards stationed here on your way: they are likely to challenge all who pass.

The Countryside (located at the Hartwell Tavern)

See the citizens of Massachusetts as they prepare for the Regulars next move. Listen to them debate the issues of the day, deal with local Tories, send supplies to Boston, drill the troops, and manage the daily tasks of working in an agrarian community such as cooking, repairing clothing, and more.

With both sides on edge and tempers flaring, the fear of a skirmish between the militia and the Regulars is very real.

The Following is the translation from the Ordonnance du Roi, Concernant le régiment Provincial de la ville de Paris. Du 20 Juin 1779. Which appeared in last month's Newsletter.

Commandment of the King Concerning the provincial regiments of the City of Paris Of the 20th of June 1779 By the King

His Majesty considers making several changes to the composition of the Provincial regiment of Paris, in order to put it in a state to satisfy the service to which He destines it; He has ordered and commands what which follows:

First Article

The officers of the Provincial regiment of Paris with be augmented by a Quartermaster-treasurer, an Adjutant, a Surgeon-major, and a Drum major, that His Majesty creates by the present Ordinance; to which it will be paid by day, know: to the Quartermaster-treasurer, 3 pounds; to the Adjutant, sixteen sous 8 deniers; to the Almoner, 1 pound 13 sous 4 deniers; to the Surgeon major, 2 pounds 10 sous; & to the Drum major, 15 sous 4 deniers: To the means of this augmentation, the officers assembly will consist of a Colonel, a Lieutenant-colonel, a Major, a Quartermaster-treasurer, two Flag-bearers, an Adjutant, an Almoner, a Surgeon-major, & a Drummajor.

2.

His Majesty establishes in each company of Grenadiers and Fusiliers, a sergeant and two corporals, in addition to those who are already there, & doing away with three men of each of the said companies.

3.

To the means of the arrangement of article 2 of the present Ordinance, each company of Grenadiers will continue to be commanded by a Captain, a Lieutenant, a (SUB)lieutenant; & and in the future will be made of three Sergeants, six Corporals, 99 Grenadiers, & two Drums: And each company of Fusiliers will also continue to be commanded by a Captain, a Lieutenant & a (SUB)lieutenant; & will be composed of three Sergeants, six Corporals, 139 Fusiliers, & two Drums.

4.

The intention of His Majesty is to count from the day of arrival of this regiment to the prescribed destination, the

Officers, lower Officers, Grenadiers, Fusiliers & Drums, so they of the creation of this corps, that those of the augmentation prescribed here below, will be paid of their appointments & pay (income), conforming to article 4 fo the Title III of the Ruling of the 1st of March 1778, concerning the Provincial Troops.

5.

As to the means of the pay which this regiment must enjoy, during their employment by His Majesty, it will be established a Mass of sixteen deniers per day per sergeant, Adjutant, Drum major, & of eight deniers for each Corporal, Grenadier, Fusilier & Drummer, for the upkeep of clothes and shoes.

6.

His Majesty authorizes the superior Officers of the Officer Corps for the said regiment, to establish a Masse of fifteen pounds per man, for the practical means in the regiments of his Infantry.

7.

The city of Paris will furnish the replacement of the men of this regiment, by way of enlistments, there will not be any leave of seniority, of reform or of pardon, except by the proposition which will be to the Secretary of War, the general Officer which his majesty charges to make the review of the inspection. The price of the said leave of grace will be taken back until the new order, between the hands of the Lieutenant general of the police of the city of Paris, in order to be joined to the funds that this city has for the raising of recruits. The duration of the enlistments will continue to be eight years, as it was ruled by His Majesty on the 24th of April 1777.

8.

His Majesty wishes that his preceding proclamations, concerning the provincial Troops, and his French Infantry, will be followed in all that is not found to be contradictory to the present [ordonnance].

His Majesty mandates and orders the Governors and Lieutenant-generals in his provinces, to the Governors and Commanders of his cities and places, to the Commissaries of War & to all his other Officers who he will be charged with the execution of the present Proclamation.

Done at Versailles the 28th of June, 1779.


