Directions : We'll be at the Old Town Hall in Stow, MA - many thanks to Dave Walrath for securing the location. Old Town Hall is on Route 117 in Stow, one block west of the intersection of Routes 117 & 62. There is limited parking on the street; additional parking is available at the "new" Town Hall directly across the street. From the East: Take Rt. 117(W) to Rt. 62 (Stow Ctr.); Old Town Hall is on the right, one block west of the Rt. 117/62 intersection. SAINTONGE HISTORY A Short Hiftory Quiz (Anfwerf)

- What is the name of the French city that the Régiment de Saintonge departed from in 1780, headed for America?
 Brest, France
- 2) During the American campaign, who is the commander of the Régiment de Saintonge?
 -Adam Phillipe Jarreck, the Count de Custine
- What month and year did the Régiment de Saintonge depart the United States?
 December 1782 (Christmas Eve to be specific)
- 4) The Americans' victory at what battle helped Benjamin Franklin negotiate a Treaty of Alliance between with France?
 The victory at Saratoga in 1777
- 5) Where did the Régiment de Saintonge travel to after leaving America? *The French Antilles in the Caribbean, and then eventually returned to Brest, France.*
- 6) What is the name of the ship that brought the Régiment de Saintonge from France to America? -Saintonge soldiers and officers were divided between several ships: La Felicite, Le Cazamov, Le Pere de Famille, L'Amazone, La Cybelle, La Fantasque, Le Jason, Le Conquerant, Le Neptune. La Fantasque carried the largest number: 19 officers and 198 men. The other ships ranged from 6-15 officers and 97-132 men.
- 7) On the march down to Yorktown, which brigade did the Régiment de Saintonge become part of and which regiments made up the rest of that brigade? -Initially the French troops marched in divisions, but while approaching New York, Rochambeau reorganized the troops into brigades. Regiments Soissonnais and Saintonge made up the 2nd Brigade for the remainder of the march to Yorktown.

- During the American campaign, what location, other than Yorktown, did the Régiment de Saintonge engage in an armed conflict? -Kings-Bridge New York
- 9) All French troops were issued white cockades for their hats. What color cockade was issued to the troops destined for America as a sign of France's allegiance?

-Black cockades represented the alliance with America.

10) During the period of the American War for Independence, France was allied with a second country. What country was it, and what color cockades were used to signify that alliance?

-France was allied with Spain as well as the US. The Spanish cockade is red and was worn over the black cockade of the Americans.





Comparifonf of Facing af Found in Von Steuben, Pickering, Manual Exercife 1764 and Ordonnance du Roi, 1776/1779

This comparison based on a running difference of opinion of the different drills used during the War of American Independence. The drills have been separated into two categories based on their motions. The first grouping will be Pickering and the '64, the second grouping Von Steuben and the Ordonnance du Roi - 1776/1779.


A. The First Grouping (British)

The first drill grouping is British in origin. Timothy Pickering was a Salem based Militia commander and a military historian in his own right. His drill, which is known by his name, is a combination of all the drills that he was exposed to at the time. Since he was an English speaker, these drills were English in origin, namely; Bland's Discipline (1727 improved in the 1740's), the Norfolk Discipline (1759), and the Manual Exercise 1764. In this grouping we will compare the left and right facings, illustrating the Pickering and the '64.


Left Facing

Count Pickering

- 1 Bring the right heel forward to the hollow of the left foot, and close to it.
- 2 Raising the toes a little, turn round on both heels to the left. The heels must be even and close together as before.



Manual Exercise 1764 Step forward with the right foot so that the heel is pointing into the instep of the left foot, the heel being about an inch away. Lift your toes and turn the body to the left.




First Position

Right Facing

- Count Pickering 1 Carry back the right foot, till the hollow of it is behind the left heel and close to it.
 - 2 Raising the toes a little, turn round on both heels to the right. The heels must be even and close together (or within half an inch, for such trifles are not to be regarded in practice) 'tis a proof that they were placed right in the first motion.

Manual Exercise 1764 Step backward with the right foot so that the heel of the left is pointing into the instep of the right. The heel of the right should be two inches directly behind the left. Lift up the toes slightly and turn the body to the right.



B. The Second Grouping (Prussian Influence)

The second grouping of facing maneuvers has a distinctive Prussian influence. Since Baron Von Steuben was a Prussian, his drill was influenced by his background in the Prussian Army and by other armies he has served with, or observed, on the European Continent. The other countries, which he had come in contact during his career, were Austria, France, and the various German principalities.

After the disastrous defeats of the Seven Years War, the French Army was reorganized in the 1760's under the ministrations of de Choiseul and his successor Saint-Germain. The French army began to copy the Prussian example by tightening the clothing, then tightening the drill (believe it or not, the two are not mutually exclusive). In 1766 the first of the "Prussianized" drills were published in an illustrated manual, illustrated due to its radical departure from the "traditional" French manuals previous. The drill was further improved on in subsequent regulations. The drill used by the French during the American Revolution was the Ordonnance du Roi of 1776 and Ordonnance du Roi 1779.


Right Facing

Count

1 Turn briskly on both heels the right, lifting the toes a little, and describing the quarter of a circle.

Von Steuben

2 Bring back the right foot to its proper position without stamping. Ordonnance du Roi of 1776 Turn 90 degrees to the right by elevating the tip of the left foot and turn on the left heel, at the same time bring the right heel to the side of the left and on the same alignment without stamping.




