Hi Folks,

As the wettest October on record closes, it is time to look to winter camp and the next campaign season – our busiest ever. PLYMOUTH TIMELINE EVENT & PARADE, Saturday, November 19 ~

No information about parking was available at the time of printing so please watch your email or check with event volunteers upon arrival. Details: We'll be spending the day in the town of Plymouth – the place to be for Thanksgiving! A timeline event will be taking place in Brewster Park and we will have a small camp setup as Regiment Saintonge. In addition, we'll be marching in a short Thanksgiving Parade through the streets of Plymouth during the middle of the day. The schedule shows the encampment opening to the public at 9am, we'll assemble at 10am for an 11am parade stepoff and finally we'll return to camp around 1pm to spend the afternoon drilling and demonstrating French military and civilian activities for the public. BATTLE FOR CHELMS FORD, Chelmfford, MA October 29 & 30

So, there we were at Chelmsford...it was Saturday morning and raining. The rain was varying from heavy mist to a reasonable shower, but it was warm. The complicated planned tactical (3 different tacticals, 30 minutes each, with 3 different sets of participants) was "simplified" into a single tactical for everyone interested. Naturally that was when the rain intensified somewhat, but we went anyway.

For me the high point of the day was as we were marching off to the tactical, still in the open field (most of the battle was in the woods), getting rained upon, trying to protect our guns from the rain. I started humming "Singing in the Rain" more or less automatically, only to see Jim Casco, of Whitcomb's Rangers, dancing along ahead of us doing his best Gene Kelly imitation. (If you don't know Jim Casco, you don't know why this is funny).

We deployed into the woods, in search of the next set of orders (the scenario was rather like a treasure huntfollow the first set of orders and they tell you where the next ones are, etc. etc.). We quickly divided into two sections of four, whereupon total chaos ensued. Every time my section (I can't speak for the other one) moved into position and began to find an enemy to shoot at, we'd be called upon to move to another position further down. This was generally not as a result of being pushed, but as a result of being needed more someplace else. So we wildly ran up and down muddy paths in the woods, trying to remain together and safe on the slippery ground, not knowing what the heck was going on. Given the weather, only half the guns were operating, but those that were working were going great.

We dodged in, out, up, down, and through the woods on that hillside, avoiding getting blasted by the RIA gun, nearly getting skewered by a small detachment from the 10th foot, and trying to figure out where we were supposed to be. Eventually we stood down, having, with a section of 3 Rangers and half a dozen Continental Lights, defended ourselves against a force something like three times our size. We marched back to camp,

through the rain and the mud, muttering to ourselves about how we weren't going out for the main battle except as pikemen...

In spite of that, we cleaned the guns as best we could, powdered up again, and lined up for the public battle. By this time the rain had picked up again somewhat (naturally), but it was a shorter hike to the battle and a shorter battle besides. When we were done, we marched back to camp, where our dismissal was rudely interrupted by a squad from the 4th foot who stood just outside the hedgerow on the edge of camp, taunting us. Having received permission from Captain Frechette to "indulge" himself, Dana led half of our company around the end of the hedgerow, while the other half set up to engage them across it. Faced with a determined and tactically intelligent enemy, the redcoats chose to beat an extremely hasty retreat.

After that we were nearly all too tired to do much except enjoy the company of friends. Then, of course, the heavens opened up during the night, but that's a story for somebody else.

BATTLE FOR CHELMS FORD, Chelmsford, MA October 29 & 30

There is a Bill Malden cartoon featuring his immortal ink soldiers Willie and Joe. In this cartoon Willie turns to Joe and say, "Yesterday you saved my life. Here is my last pair of dry socks, we're even." Never has the meaning of this cartoon been as clear to me it was the morning of October 9th, 2005. I can tell you I would have killed for a pair of dry socks! In that spirit I would like to thank the Mees family for the semi dry polar fleece and pair of flip-flops they lent me.

Ok so you'll now be surprised to hear me say that I enjoyed most of the battle of Chelmsford. Saturday was wet and kept getting wetter but it was a warm wet and that makes all the difference.

Just before lunch a young and foolish British fifer wanted into camp in regimentals... I assume to talk to our fifers. Now our fifers were feeling a bit frisky so with Dana's permission they tied him up. Now this is a family show so don't go there! They marched him back to British camp for a prisoner exchange, timed to

coincide with the start of the tactical. Hopefully Carrie or Beth will tell us the details some time.

At about noon 8 soldats and Dana marched out to join the tactical we and company of lights (six to eight guys) and three rangers with us. We moved into the woods and quickly found the British orders. Dana split us into to two platoons one under Bill, the other (my unit) under Each group fought a brisk action with Tory ranger, and English light troops for several minutes while the light infantry and rangers went after our After about ten minutes we were nearly objective. enveloped but holding and Dana decided it was time to cut our way out and let the British have their order. The cannon that was coming up may have had some thing to do with this. The two-section leap forged through the woods in somewhat less than perfect order but it was good enough for us to cut our way out. By this time Glen has the only working musket in our section, Mathew's was working intermittently, Abe and I were basically fixing imaginary bayonets and going through the motions. Sometime during this I lost track of our American allies. We made it down to the road when we saw another gun (I think it may have belonged to the Irish) Abe took us sweeping around a bush and onto the flank of the gun and we advanced. The Tenth foot charged us but it turned out they, and maybe the gun too, were "out of play" or "kind of out of play kind of in play." We fell back for this success full advance to meet up with Dana and Bill's section. About this time our lights showed up with the flag... Dana reported that the British had also gotten the flag. We called it a draw and got three bottles of rum from the English.

The 3:00 PM battle was a somewhat silly affair but pleasing to the crowed I hope. We advance out and both sides blazed at each other across the rising brook. Then back to camp for food. I'm please to know the Polish Hunter's Stew went over well. The wine the Mees brought matched the stew well. Paul O'Shaughnessy dropped by and enjoyed some Cognac with us while we discussed plans for and alliance of professionals against these American riffraff. Yeah, like we would ever be allies with Perfidious Albion.

The evening was fun but low-key singing and drinking in the Marquee. Brad Chetwynd gave a rousing little speech about how even with horrible weather reenacting was the greatest thing ever. (When I asked him to repeat this speech the next morning he said he was having a senior moment)

We broke up about 11:00 PM already aware that the event was cancelled for the second day because of the bad roads and the difficulty with what was already being called an evacuation the next day.

Some time around 2:00 AM I was awakened in a state of serious distress finding my tent flapping in an increasing breeze. I jump up threw my cloak on and tried to restake the tent but found this impossible. I called for help and thankfully Glen heard me and we secured my tent. Sadly this was not before my last pair of dry every thing had gotten soaked....

At that pint I as thinking, "I'm 25 minutes from home and warm shower and a dry bed but I can't get there from here!" It was most discouraging, but the fact that I would be home the next day heartened me. I can only stand in awe of the fortitude that kept so many men with the colors of any army when it meant suffering far great with out knowing you had a way out. The next day was "hurry up and wait" and try to stay as dry and warm as possible. At least we didn't have six inches of water in our camp like the British. Finally at about 3:30 PM I was home and got that warm shower and dry bed I had been longing for. All in all it's an experience I'm glad to have had but not one I want to repeat any time soon, if ever.
