REGIMENTAL DRILL සි WORK PARTY, Saturday, June 3 ~ Arrival: Start time for this work party is 11:00am. Directions: Please note that we will be meeting at Steven & Heather's house. Take Route 20 East or Route 128 to Route 20 West. Follow Route 20 into Sudbury. At the set of lights immediately after the Shaw's Supermarket Plaza (heading east) or Sudbury Farms (heading west), turn onto Nobscot Road. Follow Nobscot Road into Framingham. 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### SOUTHBURY, CT, June 17 & 18~

Arrival: For those arriving on Friday Night, plan on arriving no later than 6:30 to help setup Camp. Sgt Dixion will on site to coordinate camp setup. **Details:** Participants may begin to arrive Friday June 16 at Noon till 10:00 PM. After on-site registration, please seek out either the Quartermaster or quartermaster sergeant to direct you to your space within the encampment before unloading any equipment. Their tent will be marked in the encampment at Flood Bridge Road. All participants are strongly encouraged to arrive before 9:00AM Saturday, if they desire to be able to access the site with a vehicle. The camps will be closed to all vehicular traffic from 9:00AM Saturday morning and 9:00AM Sunday morning until the closing of camps each day. Late arrivals must carry their equipment in from the parking area. Exceptions will be made, of course, for emergencies. Registration will begin at Noon until 10:00PM Friday and reopen at 6AM Saturday morning through 9:00AM, but later arrivals will be asked to carry their belongings into the camps as a courtesy to those

already set up and in anticipation of visitors arriving. Units wishing to encamp together must either arrive together or send their tentage together in one vehicle. Spaces will not be reserved as to avoid gaps and holes in the lines. History of the Event: In 1780 Rochambeau landed in Newport, RI to await orders Commander-in-Chief, from his new George Washington. Over the next year Rochambeau met with Washington to plan their war strategy. Rochambeau suggested bypassing the British as New York City and marching to Virginia to wage the major battle there. Finally Washington agreed to the French General's plan.

Rochambeau sent his troops in waves of 1,000 westward into Connecticut, meeting up with Washington in New York State and then south to Yorktown, VA along what we now call the Washington and Rochambeau Revolutionary Route (W3R). This historic route extends from Newport, RI to Yorktown, VA where the allies, with the aid of Rochambeau, defeated British Cornwallis. **The Competition:** Open to all registered participants and all forces that have had weapons and cartridge box inspections at the morning parade.

-The individual company commanders will conduct all safety inspections.

-The unit commanders will then forward a list of participating teams providing name, rank, and unit affiliations to the event organizer.

#### **Competition** *Rules:*

For each heat (Allied, British, semi's and finals) 1. Form up as four man musket teams, no rifles. Multiple teams per unit OK.

2. Conduct safety inspection. Flash guards and hammer stalls **required**; **must** use hammer stalls between shots.

Field officer orders loading by the commands.
Field officer gives 'make ready', 'present', 'fire'.
Firing commences.

5. Team NCO's take over 'prime and load' and 'fire' commands by their respective drills and firing continues for 4 more volleys.

6. Disinterested member assigned to each team to witness all muskets go off. Volley is not completed until all muskets are discharged.

7. After firing of 5th volley NCO orders 'fix bayonets' and 'shoulder arms'. First team to shoulder wins. *Cartridges and powder are the responsibility of the contestants. Roll your own.* 

All Participants in full uniforms.

A faux target for effect will be placed down range.

## RIDGEFIELD, CT, July 1 & 2~

Arrival: Camp opens at noon, like most people the Regimental Staff has to work and most likely won't be there until 6:30pm or 7:00pm. Please plan to be there around that time to help setup camp. Directions: Proceed west from Danbury on 1-84 toward Brewster, NY. Take EXIT 1, Saw Mill Road. Go left on to Saw Mill Rd. and proceed 1.3 miles until Saw Mill Rd becomes Ridgebury Road. After another 1.8 miles, Old Stagecoach Road will intersect diagonally on your left. Turn onto Old Stagecoach and left site entrance/registration will be on your right after half a mile. Brief History: On June 30, 1781 General Jean Baptiste Donatien le Vimeur comte de Rochambeau received an urgent summons from General Washington to break camp in Newtown, CT and march post-haste to the White Plains. Le comte swiftly reorganized his army by brigades, rather than as individual regimental divisions as they had been marching since departing Newport, RI the 10th of June. The first brigade, consisting of the Bourbonnais and Deux-Ponts regiments, left immediately with Rochambeau for their next camp in Ridgebury, arriving mid-day on July 1st. The second brigade (Soissonnais and Saintonge) tramped in next day. The French main camp lay across from Ridgebury Congregational Church (still standing today) at the intersection of Ridgebury Road and the George Washington Highway. An advance camp of chaussers under Captain Alexandre Berthier then took up a protective position along Ridgebury Road about a mile to the south of Rochambeau. Eight miles to the southwest, Hussars of Duc du Lauzun's mounted legion screened the French flank. That evening, le comte celebrated his 56th birthday dining at Samuel Keeler's tavern with his officers on frog legs reputedly gathered from local ponds.

Wethersfield, CT May 21, 2006

Bonjour, mon soldat le freres!

The arrival of the 85<sup>th</sup> St Onge at the Webb-Deane-Stevens House museum started with our president, Adam arriving at 8:15 AM and Pvt Hutchinson and Pvt Hutchinson at 8:30 AM. The morning was crisp and sunny and we found the 5th Connecticut about the campfire, just finishing their breakfasts, with the exception of a pair of feet that were still in one of the tents, presumably attached to their owner. Old acquaintances were renewed and the necessary introductions were made. We were pleasantly surprised by the appearance of our northern arm in the form of Bernard Rieu and his charming wife, Carmen from Quebec City. They were pleased to have been invited and declared their intentions of strolling down the street in hopes of finding a good cup of coffee and some pastry to start off the day.

The arrival of the rest of our hardy crew, bringing our total to nine, allowed us the opportunity of exercising our wits as to the best way of erecting the marquis and fly. This was accomplished just in time for the opening of the camp to the public. Our friends Bob Selig and the Comte de Rochambeau were among the visitors to our camp, the Comte recounting his budding equestrian skills after only two riding lessons. We engaged ourselves in drill for the benefit of the photographing public and did well. Afterwards our collective food supplies were pooled, supplemented by some ham, cheese and bread procured by Bill Rose and lunch ensued under the fly.

The organizers gave instructions regarding the afternoon parade and signing ceremony with General Washington and Rochambeau. Steven quickly ran us through some marching maneuvers and wheels in anticipation of the parade around the grounds in which we were to be joined by a fife and drum corps. At approximately 1 PM, we were assembled on the green behind the house. The 5<sup>th</sup> CT led the way to the beginning of the parade route and we were followed by the distaff members of the 5<sup>th</sup> CT and some museum staff. We presently came up behind the fife and drum corps, marched a short way and stopped. The parade line up was changed and the officers riding horses were place in front of us and the 5<sup>th</sup> CT and behind the fifes and drums. When the music commenced, it was discovered that Rochambeau's aged nag was actually a spirited filly who was not one bit pleased with the music. Rochambeau was remarkable in maintaining his seat while the horse was straining at the bit, and managed to leave the saddle on his own terms. He wisely decided to walk the parade route with Bob Selig.

The parade continued without any further incidents and ended in front of the tavern on the green where a plaque was dedicated. It was agreed that we looked very well, even during the dreaded wheels. We then marched back to the Webb-Deane-Stevens house, minus Pvt Hutchinson who was selected for sentry duty along with a representative of the 5<sup>th</sup> CT, Jack Sheffield. They had a quick meeting behind the house while General Washington, Rochambeau and Bob Selig were being wired for sound and the two sentries were instructed by no less than Washington himself that there was to be, "no laughing, no smiling, no waving at the crowd or friends. You will be motionless unless ordered. This is a serious event." As a result, during the ceremony even a very annoved would-be photographer was unable to motion Pvt Hutchinson out of the way. Finally, thanks to non-verbal communication that only experienced friends like Bill and Steven could pull off, Steven gave the command to the sentries to order firelocks, just in the nick of time. The ceremony included a history of the event presented by Bob Selig and Washington and Rochambeau drank a toast to their alliance under the big A very international crowd of spectators was on top. hand to applaud this great achievement.

The rain gave us enough warning to get the tents down without getting wet, which we did in record time. The museum stayed open for us and offered free admission to those in uniform. Several of us took the tours through the marvelous houses which were presented in different time periods throughout the rooms. A quick trip to the church was also made, and one of our members even managed a tour of the old part of the cemetery behind the church, spying a tablestone that was dated 1648. The docent in the museum said it was the original, but further examination indicated that the stone had been recarved.

At the end of the day, we were ready for the trip home. It was rumored that Bill and Frank were going to have beers in Hartford and chase little children, but the next day's papers had no mention of it.

A Brief Hiftory Leffon (continued from the March Gazette)

Our Officer continues to explain garrison life to a newly arrived Cadet. There is a tapping at the door.

"Yes, Come!"

"Monsignor, the sand for the cartridges has arrived." "Excellent! Set the six new recruits to rolling it into cartridges right away. Firing class is coming up tomorrow and I want them all to participate.

Not everyone has been as fortunate as you, M. le Cadet, and handled firearms since birth. No, no- your reputation as a marksman precedes you. Plenty of marsh fowl to be taken at your place, eh?

Well, some of these poor fellows hardly know where to put the powder when they come to us. We show them, though. We start them off rolling cartridges, without a bullet, using fine sand instead of powder. Then they do the firing sequence in dumb show until they get it right. Three shots a minuet is our standard and they must be able to do better than that before they are allowed to burn real powder. They must know their fusil very well before being allowed onto the field. We have a class for one hour every eight days and there they learn and prove their abilities in the dismantling, reassembling and maintaining their arms, all under the supervision of the Sergeant Major and Caporal d'Armes.

These two follow each recruit along the path of gun maintenance much as an older brother would, only without the blows. We even have a remedial class every four days in order to make sure that the learning sticks. The soldats must treat their weapons well and the Sergeant Major makes sure that they do. He must visually inspect the weapons each Sunday and notes which ones need repairs or more than routine care. He must then provide his Captain with a reckoning of those pieces in bad repair or in need of replacement. Pity the poor soldat who does not care for his piece, because if it is due to his neglect, he must pay for the repairs or, heaven forbid, the replacement costs.

After a thorough review by the Captain of the Sergeant Major's report and an inspection of the weapons in question, the report moves on to the Commandant of the Regiment who orders the corrections made.

They are good men really and I must say that they are easily filled with Love for the King and the Regiment.

That being said, however, you must always be on guard for the odd cat who uses his bayonet as a screwdriver. We always catch the blockheads who cannot manage to find the proper tool and after their punishment, we make them replace the ruined bayonet. The armorers hate seeing those nicked and misused weapons, especially when not nicked in the line of battle.

Well, yes, you are correct. Weapons do not just break on Sunday. Whenever a weapon breaks down, the soldat must present it to his Commanding Officer who will decide the nature of the repairs and whether the Soldat or Crown pays for the repairs. Just as you can be sure that each soldat is issued three flints, you can be assured that all fusil are well noted in out ledgers.

Sunday is a busy day for us. Our combat readiness is first observed by the Caporal d'Armes and then by the Sergeant Major who will tick off each item as required in our readiness handbook. He then submits the completed list to the office of the commanding Captain who signs the report and passes it along to the Administrative Council.

We take such care of our weapons because they belong to the Crown. While each man is issued equipment and arms, he must care of them as if they were his, but he must also realize they the ultimately belong to the King. They are the only defense standing between destruction and us.
