# Detailed Information from Northern Department Continental Line Meeting

Here is some of the key information that came out of the Northern CL meeting which took place on November 18<sup>th</sup>. Steven Taskovics attended this meeting. The following notes are provided by Brenda Lavin of the 2<sup>nd</sup> Mass.

#### **Insurance:**

John Taber urged all units to send in updated copies of their insurance to Sam Reco. You can bring a copy to the CL meeting if that's easier. He explained that the CL is trying to have a more organized database of information on all units. This will only work if each unit sends their insurance info and other contact information to Sam. Bob Allegretto is heading up a committee to collect all the information and create a spread sheet. Then this can be used by all units. Bob A mentioned that if you contact your insurance company they will send the paperwork to whomever you'd like.

#### Safety:

We need to appoint a committee or have the board create guidelines to have units coming in with guns make sure they reapply as a different branch. If they want to change to Artillery or bring in Artillery they need to apply as an Artillery group as well as an infantry group. Add some wording to the bylaws.

#### **Relationships with other groups:**

Meeting was running late didn't spend time on this topic. However Neil mentioned that the British Brigade is holding their first elections in 16 years. He said expect some changes coming in the Brigade.

#### 2006 Event Review (Highlights):

Battle Rd Park added Bloody Angel in 2006. Park Service loved what we did. Crown Forces loved it too. Very positive feedback from all sides. Mike Monihan is now organizing Battle Rd. He's just trying to get everyone organized for 2007. 2006 was well attended. The Park is looking for the same in 2007.

More units would have been better on the American side. It was noted that leadership, (not the 5<sup>th</sup> CT.) but others were coarse, harsh and badmouthing the French. Behind the scenes were not so smooth.

Yorktown, VA: The French had a big turnout. They had over 100 men at arms. Steve said that every musket was safe. All had a great time. There were 1050 allied men at arms. Total reenactors: 3200. Brad mentioned that the national parks people were impressed. They loved that we were there to make the site come alive. In the spring a DVD will be available. You can go to <a href="https://www.lionheartfilmworks.com">www.lionheartfilmworks.com</a> and review clips. Cost of the DVD will be \$20.00. Everything about this event was positive. If you didn't go you missed a great event. There were over 50,000 spectators.

Dear Mr. Carriere,

This letter is to express my great admiration and appreciation of the superb conduct of the Saintonge Regiment at several events marking the 225' Anniversary of Yorktown 1781. From the moment of their smart and well disciplined appearance at the early morning ceremony held at the French Monument, the Saintonge's presence provided a special elegance to the various commemorative ceremonies. One could see that even the modern-day senior military and naval officers, as well as civilian government officials from the US and France were drawn by the Saintonge's presence into the unique atmosphere of the Yorktown ceremonies.

The Saintonge's participation made all the difference at events that were special to many French visitors who crossed the Atlantic just for the 225th Yorktown Anniversary. The appreciation was also felt by many Americans who are interested in the actual history of the Yorktown Campaign and wish to see fully recognized the contribution of France. I know that the Virginia Daughters of the American Revolution were most excited by the Saintonge's participation in the dedication of their 'Washington-Rochambeau Route to Victory' display. In particular, I wish to note the initiative and the enthusiasm of the Saintonge to participate in a quickly organized ceremony commemorating the French troops of the Gatinais and Royal Deux-Ponts who fell during the storming of the British Redoubt 9 on the night of 14 October 1781. The leader of the large French delegation of SAR, DAR and war veteran associations, M. Comte de Jacques Trentinian, made the following comment: the Saintonge's participation "was necessary to make this event memorable and I hope a precedent to be re-enacted every year from now"; it was "moving contribution to our common goal to revive the past and create the positive impulse to American and French friendship."

Regrettably, I cannot name all the Saintonge individuals who deserve praise for their energetic portrayals of French troops in our Revolution. However, Dana Rock, whom I understand is the commanding officer of the regiment, must be congratulated for directing the unit's spectacular performances in an array of different ceremonies.

The magnificent panache exhibited by Steven Taskovics directing his Saintonge formation about on the fields [and as 'Baron de Viom6nil' leading the assault on Redoubt 9] was exceptional.

Importantly, the ability of the French delegates to connect with and to coordinate their agenda with the Saintonge was due to the assistance of Bill Rose - usually a k a 'von Closen', but at most of these occasions an impressive 'de Grasse' appearing along with John Welsh [a k a 'Rochambeau'].
