While Dana and Steven were traveling for work, there was a Battle Road planning meeting that I was asked to attend. At this meeting we began to plan for the event that is the official opening to our re-enacting season, Battle Road. But what also came out of that meeting was a cry for help.

For many years there has been a commemoration at the North Bridge in Concord known as "Commemoration of the Concord Conflict", where a group of Minutemen stand up to the vast British Army and eventually repel the Crown forces. In years past the numbers were strong and there was much support for this event. But as we all know times changed and the involvement in this event has lost much of its support. To the point that the British forces, who actually take the time to mourn their losses here, are saying that if something is not done they are planning on ending their association with this event.

NPS has asked that the Saintonge/4th Middlesex to try to add a few more bodies to the Tactical Demonstration at North Bridge and bolster more support. For years past the numbers have been very lopsided. It does not make sense for the British to get repelled from the bridge by five militia members when they have fielded forty.

What I am looking for is some numbers from our unit. The event will take place on the Patriot's Day holiday, April 16th. This will be a quick tactical demonstration using the same rules of engagement that are currently enforced during Battle Road. I realize that not everybody has the ability to take time from work or from their duties at home. I am also contacting other units and individuals that might be willing to assist us with this event. If we do not do anything about this event then it will go away and as re-enactors this is something we cannot let happen.

For those people who already march in the parade that takes place after the end of tactical demonstration, we will hopefully have 15 or 20 minutes in between the two events. That should allow enough time to reach the beginning of the parade that goes to the center of Concord.

We do not have times set up yet, we have another Battle Road meeting this week and this tactical demonstration is the first item on the agenda. When there is more information I will post it in our newsgroup and chat group. If you have any questions about the event please feel free to let me know.

The goal is to make things move a little faster than last year, as well as to improve upon the impression of making the scenario look like we are pushing the Red Coats back to Boston.

We have been approached by NPS to organize the event at the Bridge on April, 16th. This is traditionally organized by Mark Daley, however the turnout for the past couple of years has been poor. NPS has asked us to supplement these numbers and bring another 30 men at arms to participate at this event. If you are able to make it, please let me know as soon a possible.

The Annual Meeting is fast approaching. It has been difficult securing a time and location for this event. However, with the help of Brian, Adam, Steve Crosby and Dave Walrath, we have secured a site. We will be meeting on February 17th at the Old Stow Town Hall. As usual, we will be holding a Drill as well as pot luck at this event. Details can be found later in this newsletter.

A concern that I would like to address in this group is communications. There are several key members in this organization who work very hard to make sure that we have strong organization that is very active in the reenacting community. One of the challenges that we all face is communication. It is very important that the leaders of this group keep the membership up to date with pertinent information, and I believe that we as a group have done a decent job at this. It is also very important that the membership communicates with each other and more importantly, to the leadership. We, as a unit, do a very poor job of communicating back to the leadership about up coming events. From the North, take Rt. 2 or Rt. 111 to Rt 62(W); take Rt. 62 to Rt. 117 and turn right for one block.

Drilling on Frank's Flats January 13, 2007

Despite the cool, clouds and drizzle, sixteen muskets brought their owners to Marini's hideout in Berlin. It had been a rough evening the night before. The meeting time was adjusted from 10:00 AM to noon to allow those who attended the Twelfth Night Ball in disguise time to assess the self-inflicted damage. All the members appeared to be in shape for the first drilling session of the season and the verbal picks and axes were at the ready.

At approximately 12:30, with the distaff busily engaged in much-needed projects inside, we fell out under orders from Sgt Fisher with Musician Humphreys playing and skipping to assembly. We discovered the recently AWOL Private Mixter in the proper uniform having failed to obtain a section 8 discharge by wearing women's clothing and another new recruit for which credit for the impressment thereof belonged to Captain Rock. The inspection that followed underscored our attention to duty to keep our weapons on the cutting edge, with only a few minor exceptions. Who if the King of France?

(The following article started as a conversation online with C-.)

Who is the King of the Saintongenais? Who will tie the white scarf of approbation to our flag when we visit France? Who is the living successor to Louis XVI?

To answer this question, my dramatic plan is to start with that far off '89 and bring us up to our own current time. Please inform me as to any mistakes I might make in this recitation.

Louis XVI, all Louis will be referred to by their number, to avoid confusion, lost his opportunity to become a Constitutional Monarch and consequently lost his life. His wife was executed as well, despite her disqualification from holding the throne of France, being only able to fulfill one of the three basic requirements of French Monarchy: born a Roman Catholic, born in France and born a male.

XVI left two generations on maiden aunts and two children. The daughter married an Austrian and had no children.

The son was locked in a room without any sanitation until he perished, washed and trimmed only days before he died. His heart has been preserved in the crypt of St. Denis.

XVI had two younger brothers, the Dukes of Provence and Artois. Provence became XVIII with the fall of Napoleon. He ruled France with a hundred day vacation in England, courtesy of Monsieur N, until the throne passed to Charles X, Artois as was. XVIII has no issue.

Charles X ruled for several years until the people, fed up with corruption and a reactionary Church, forced him to abdicate.

He passed the crown to XIX, who held it long enough to cross the room with his own abdication papers, giving them to representatives of his cousin, Louis Philippe of Orleans.

The Orleanist line was founded by monsieur, XIV younger brother. The parallel development of his house was viewed with distaste by the mainstream Bourbon. Their relative freedom, ability to make money and develop real estate- notably the Palais Royal, were galling to XVI and his family.

Louis Philippe's father, Louis Philippe Joseph; Duc de Chartres, discarded his "Orleans" for the more current "Egalite" and voted for the execution of his cousin. He himself was snagged by the Committee and executed in 1793. His son, Louis Philippe, was safely imprisoned through the Revolution, waited out Napoleon's Empire and the Bourbon Restoration. It was to him that XIX resigned. It was Louis Philippe who was proclaimed Monarch on the balcony of the Hotel de Ville of Paris, his shoulders draped with the Tricolour by La Fayette, before a now Constitutional populace. The bourgeois King ruled until he turned into a pear and lost to a government eventually ruled by a newspaper editor, Napoleon III and his beautiful Spanish wife.

XIX had a younger brother who assumed the name "Henri V" and remained the only true Bourbon to the followers of what was by now called the Legitimist Party. Henri V died without issue in 1883. He was the last Bourbon of France. There were no more.

But wait! Did you say the "*last Bourbon of France*"? What about XIV's grandson, Philippe, who became Felipe V of Spain? Is he not more of the Royal Blood than any Orleanist?

Well, a war was fought over this very question. The dispute was resolved at the Treaty of Utrecht, 1713. The treaty calls for the complete separation of the two Bourbon families and denies them access to the throne of the country not of their birth.

In the mid 1820's the Spanish Bourbons were further split over a succession dispute and the ascent of an Isabella. The anti female secessionists were called the "Carlist" The Carlist survive to this day despite suppression and persecution by the Spanish Crown and Republic and mild toleration of the Falangist, who fall a bit to their left. They have thrown their hat into the Royal French Ring, despite the strictures of the Treaty of Utrecht, because of the greater evil posed by the descendents of the Regicide and his son, the Bourgeois King.

Henri VII, son of VI, is the current Orleanist (although a Guise) hopeful, despite his civil divorce and remarriage, which disqualifies him in the eyes of the strict. He has four children, none of whom are qualified to carry on the throne, even as the descendent of XIV's brother.

The Spanish Bourbons are forbidden by the Treaty of Utrecht to be involved with the French Throne and have little credibility in either country.

Thus the blank looks by Frenchmen when we cry "Vive le Roi!" Perhaps we can find a General of a later incarnation of our regiment to tie our scarf. But then, the thread of Saintonge is as tangled a skein as the Bourbon succession.
